Dear Commemorative Partners,

As we step into Autumn, we celebrate another Service branch birthday ... that of the U.S. Navy! 246 years ago—October 13, 1775, nearly six months after the Revolutionary War began—the Continental Congress authorized two armed vessels to sea, effectively initiating the United States Navy. Though disbanded in 1785, the Naval Act of 1794 reestablished it and formed the Department of the Navy. It is October 13, however, that we recognize and celebrate the Navy's birth.

During the Vietnam War period, the Navy performed a wide array of missions. *In the air*, it projected power from the flight decks of its carriers, and was a key partner with the Air Force during the ROLLING THUNDER and LINEBACKER air campaigns. *On the coast*, the Navy

engaged in naval gunfire support missions against enemy targets in the littoral areas of Vietnam, developed a highly effective blockade to prevent the resupply of enemy forces by sea, and provided amphibious transport for Marines operating in I Corps. *On rivers*, it stood up task forces designed to protect commercial traffic, assist allied ground forces, and interdict enemy troops and supplies moving on these inland waterways. Some noteworthy facts about our Navy's Vietnam War service and sacrifice:

- 16 sailors were recognized for their gallant combat actions with the Medal of Honor—six are living today: <u>Donald E. Ballard</u>, <u>Robert R. Ingram</u>, <u>Thomas G. Kelley</u>, <u>Thomas R. Norris</u>, <u>Michael E. Thornton</u>, and <u>Joseph R. Kerrey</u>.
- Of the **58,281** names on the **Vietnam Veterans Memorial**—**2,569** are sailors.
- 352 are counted among the 1,584 who remain missing and unaccounted for.
