Dear Commemorative Partners,

February, we celebrate <u>Black History Month</u> and highlight the remarkable achievements of our Nation's African Americans! Also known as *National African American History Month*, *Black History Month* dates back almost a century ago when historian Carter G. Woodson selected the second week in February, 1926—signifying the birth month of abolitionist and social reformer Frederick Douglass, and also that of 16th U.S. President Abraham Lincoln, who issued the Emancipation Proclamation—to celebrate African American contributions to this remarkable republic. For five decades, every U.S. president since our 38th, Gerald Ford, has officially designated February as *Black History Month*. We mark its significance this year by spotlighting our Nation's African American Vietnam veterans and their selfless service and sacrifice!

More than 300,000 African American troops served in the U.S. military during the Vietnam War. Of these, 22 were conferred the <u>Medal of Honor</u>—the Nation's highest award for conspicuous gallantry in combat—and three remain alive today: <u>John L. Canley</u>, <u>Melvin Morris</u> and <u>Clarence E. Sasser</u>. Reading their citations provides a small glimpse into the extraordinary character of these men, and watching short, yet powerful Medal of Honor video tributes to <u>Sasser</u> and <u>Charles C. Rogers</u> promises to leave you awestruck!
